Brief Profile of G. Ramachandran

G. Ramachandran, who had a brilliant career in the Civil Services, was a First Class First in MA Economics from the Madras University and stood first in the All India Competitive Exam for appointment to the IAS in 1949. He served as Personal Secretary to Chief Minister Rajaji and worked later with Chief Ministers Kamaraj, Bakthavatsalam and Annadurai with distinction. He was the youngest officer to become Finance Secretary in Tamil Nadu in 1965.

G. Ramachandran was handpicked for the post of Joint Secretary (Economics) by Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's Secretariat in 1969. He helped Prime Minister Indira Gandhi to formulate progressive measures like Bank Nationalisation and Poverty Alleviation.

G. Ramachandran rose to become Finance Secretary, Government of India, a strategic position in the management of the financial affairs of the country. He continued in the post of Finance Secretary in the Janata regime, despite the political changes, to serve under Prime Ministers Morarji Desai and Charan Singh. He finally retired in 1985 as Executive Director of the Asian Development Bank, Manila.

G. Ramachandran, besides being a highly rated intellectual, was a voracious reader, an avid lover of cricket and an engaging conversationalist.
